FY 2019/20 to FY 2024/25

This workplan outlines the goals and objectives set forth by the Youth Workghout, a public private partnership of organizations committed to preventing youth suickle in Los Angeles Gounty. The Youth Workghout is a subcommittee of the Los Angeles County Suickle Prevention Network (LASPN). The work plan compliments the larger aukido prevention strategic plan developed by the LASPN and supports the following guiding principles:



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Program Implementation

Objective 1.1. By the end of the 2024/2025 school year, a minimum of 25% of schools have a peer-based club, program, wellness center, or are actively promoting Teen Line on campus.

Objective 1.2. By the end of the 2024/2025 school year, a minimum of 25% of schools implement at least one effective program or strategy intended to reduce risk and strengthen protective factors suitable to meet the needs of their student body..

Suicide Prevention Policies and Practices

Implementation Leads: Jewel and Susan

Activity 2: Assist districts with implementing comprehensive and effective suicide prevention strategies.

Objective 2.1, 2.2. and 2.3: By the end of the 2024/2025 school year, 100% of districts will answer **yes** that they have provide some type of suicide prevention staff training to their staff on annual basis, provide suicide prevention informational events and resources to parents, implement at least one suicide prevention youth engagement program, and have a comprehensive plan to handle a death by suicide on campus.





Social Emotinal Learning

Objective 1.3. By the end of the 2024/2025 school year, some staff in every school are trained in Social Emotional Learning (SEL) teaching techniques, and implement research-based SEL strategies.

Los Angeles County Office of Education (https://www.lacoe.edu)

The Los Angeles County Office of Education (LACOE) and the Center for Distance and Online Learning (CDOL) in the Division of Curriculum and Instructional Services (CIS) continued to support the mental health needs to our school districts, charter schools, and private schools through the Suicide Prevention Ongoing Resiliency Training (SPORT) project. Many school districts, charter school networks, and private schools depend on the SPORT project for continued guidance and support in complying with the mandates of AB2246 and AB 1767. For the 2020-21 school year, CDOL focused SPORT training and implementation for districts that were identified for support under the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA). Additionally, CDOL offers Technology Enhanced Arts Learning (TEAL), which focuses on arts integration, social-emotional learning and trauma-informed practices to build capacity in arts education, utilizing the same successful blended learning format.

2020-2021 SPORT Outcomes (https://preventsuicide.lacoe.edu/):

- 1-Day Virtual Conference provided suicide prevention, intervention, postvention, and student resiliency content to teachers, school administrators, and school-based mental health support staff.
- 33 LEAs including school districts, charter schools, CDE Suicide Prevention Team Leads, and San Bernardino Superintendent of Schools COE Mental Health Team received professional development and support.
- 28 customized coaching sessions were provided designed to support suicide prevention, intervention, and postvention needs of the participating school districts
- Provided Student Mental Wellbeing (SMWB) asynchronous online training modules

2020-2021 TEAL Outcomes (https://tealarts.lacoe.edu/):

- Two 2-Day Foundational Virtual Conferences reached 225 participants from 36 districts representing 89 schools within LA County
- Transformative Virtual Conference serviced at 21 districts/charter networks and 37 schools
- Provided access to TEAL Online Learning Modules and Compassionate Care Packages to increase equitable capacity in the areas of culturally inclusive and diverse arts integration embedded with social emotional learning competencies.

After a rigorous screening process, the LASPN created a Youth Advisory Board comprised of 23 teenagers and young adults from across greater Los Angeles. The group participates in monthly trainings by community partners about various mental health issues, to help build their knowledge and advocacy as mental health ambassadors in their communities. They are currently planning projects for 2022 related to mental health in the areas of art and film, outreach and education. and advocacy.



Youth Engagement

Objective 2.3: By the end of the 2024/2025 school year, schools in districts with above average suicide ideation, as identified by the Healthy Kids Survey or other data, implement at least one youth suicide prevention program on an ongoing basis.

- Obtain baseline of current practices by by public school districts by September 2019 through district survey, and by June 2021 for private and charter districts.
- Compile a list of evidence-based or promising suicide prevention youth engagement programs and review with school and youth stakeholders.
- On an annual basis provide information to implement the free Directing Change Youth Suicide Prevention Program to schools. As resources permit, provide mini grants to schools, prioritizing schools with no existing youth engagement programs.
- Provide districts, schools, and Parent Teacher Associations with information about Teen Line as a resource for their children.



Teen Line (www.teenline.org)

Teen Line is an anonymous hotline for teenagers that operates every evening from 6 p.m. to10 p.m. PST. Teen Line volunteers who answer the calls, emails and texts are Los Angeles teenagers who have received specialized training. In addition to operating the crisis line, Teen Line supports teens through online message boards, outreach, education and professional trainings.

2020 Outcomes

17,354 calls, emails and texts with 980 suicidal teens helped on the hotline 24,378 parents, school, staff, youth organization staff and law enforcement officers trained in suicide prevention

5,336 youth participated in outreach programs







Directing Change Program (www.DirectingChangeCA.org)

The Directing Change Program educates youth ages 12-25 about the warning signs of suicide, mental health, and how to help themselves or a friend with an initiative that engages them in the creation of short films on these topics. Additional services by Directing Change include outreach, parent engagement, and trainings for educators and districts focusing on implementing comprehensive school-based suicide prevention policies

Outcomes

42,589 youth, parents, and community members reached through program, mini grants, and events

332 films about suicide prevention and mental health created by Los Angele County youth 211 school administrators from 56 Los Angeles County schools/districts trained virtually on implementing suicide prevention policies

In 2020, Directing Change launched a new category titled Hope and Justice that asked youth to create art pieces in any medium about either what brings them hope, a social justice topic they feel passionate about, or a rotating monthly submission topic around the social distancing, election, self-love, representation, substance use, mental health and other topics.

 164 art pieces by 175 Los Angeles County youth in the 2020-2021 program year.

SAFETY-A (Safe Alternatives for Teens & Youth - Acute)

Evidence-based intervention for suicidal youth

Rooted in cognitive-behavioral and family systems theory

Involves caregivers/parents throughout the therapeutic assessment and intervention process

Initially designed for use in the ED and adapted for use in other settings

Effective in enhancing linkage to mental health care



Safety-ATarget Population

NOT for students you are sure will require hospitalization

<u>USE with</u> students with identified risk that require continued screening to identify next steps when it is not immediately clear that they will require hospitalization

<u>USE with</u> student as part of school reintegration plan
